<u>Lent: The Last Seven Days: Easter</u> – Mark Scene 42 Jonathan Cleveland Mark 16:1-8 April 12, 2020

Reflection & Discussion Questions

Read and discuss Mark 16:1-3 (NIV)

¹When the Sabbath was over, Mary Magdalene, Mary the mother of James, and Salome bought spices so that they might go to anoint Jesus' body. ² Very early on the first day of the week, just after sunrise, they were on their way to the tomb ³ and they asked each other, "Who will roll the stone away from the entrance of the tomb?"

*What is this passage saying? *What do you imagine these women are feeling?

We are not even strong enough to move the stone

Sometimes the world gets so dark we can begin to wonder if love, hope, and light might be an illusion.

*How have you been reminded of your smallness recently? *When was a moment in your life that you can identify with these women – 'I can't even move the stone'?

Read and discuss Mark 16:4-8 (NIV)

⁴ But when they looked up, they saw that the stone, which was very large, had been rolled away. ⁵ As they entered the tomb, they saw a young man dressed in a white robe sitting on the right side, and they were alarmed.

⁶ "Don't be alarmed," he said. "You are looking for Jesus the Nazarene, who was crucified. He has risen! He is not here. See the place where they laid him. ⁷ But go, tell his disciples and Peter, 'He is going ahead of you into Galilee. There you will see him, just as he told you."

⁸ Trembling and bewildered, the women went out and fled from the tomb. They said nothing to anyone, because they were afraid.

*What is this passage saying? What does it tell us about God? *What do you imagine these women are feeling now? *What makes this an intriguing ending to the book of Mark?

We have a choice: we have nothing, even when it feels like we have something OR we have everything even when it feels like we have nothing

One of these is real and one is an illusion and we choose which we believe.

*What is difficult about making the choice between these two? *What does holding on to hope look like for you right now? Where do you see this hope in practice around you? *How can we encourage each other to be people of hope? How can we encourage our neighbors to look up?

*Visio divina – a thoughtful and slow way of contemplating a visual prompt like a piece of art, photograph or image and inviting God to speak to you through it. First, focus on the detail that your eyes are drawn to right away – keep focus there and pay attention to what thoughts and emotions you are having. Then, look at the entire image and consider it as a whole, being aware of thoughts, questions and emotions it provokes. End in silence and prayer, considering your experience and anything you feel called to respond to.
