Reflection & Discussion Questions

Temptations have the potential to destroy us

Like trials, they can bring about steadfastness too, but the two are different

*What are some differences between trials and temptations?

God does not tempt us

James is saying it's actually something going on inside of you.

Read and discuss James 1:13-15(ESV)

¹³ Let no one say when he is tempted, "I am being tempted by God," for God cannot be tempted with evil, and he himself tempts no one. ¹⁴ But each person is tempted when he is lured and enticed by his own desire. ¹⁵ Then desire when it has conceived gives birth to sin, and sin when it is fully grown brings forth death.

- *What can we learn about temptation from these verses?
- *When have you blamed God or others for a mess you found yourself in?
- *What does a 'lure from our own desire' look like?

We don't fight our temptations by fighting harder against them

We fight our temptations by YIELDING to God.

- *What does it mean to yield instead of fight?
- *How can we peel back some layers for an honest look at what tempts us?
- *Is there a trigger or lure based on some brokenness that needs to be addressed?

In contrast to the origin of temptation is the origin of goodness

Every good gift has its source in God.

Read and discuss lames 1:16-18(ESV)

¹⁶ Do not be deceived, my beloved brothers. ¹⁷ Every good gift and every perfect gift is from above, coming down from the Father of lights, with whom there is no variation or shadow due to change. ¹⁸ Of his own will he brought us forth by the word of truth, that we should be a kind of firstfruits of his creatures.

*How do verses 16-18 contrast with 13-15; the trajectory of death versus the trajectory of life? *What do you think James means by 'firstfruits'?

We have to let our faith change everything inside of us

We are saved by receiving what he has given to us.

Read and discuss James 1:19-21(ESV)

¹⁹ Know this, my beloved brothers: let every person be quick to hear, slow to speak, slow to anger; ²⁰ for the anger of man does not produce the righteousness of God. ²¹ Therefore put away all filthiness and rampant wickedness and receive with meekness the implanted word, which is able to save your souls.

*What do verses 19 & 20 say in context about dealing with temptation?

*How does being quick to listen and slow to speak and get angry help us find the lures that entice us?

*The word 'receive' here means more than to passively accept – to fully embrace. How have you embraced the word to put off the old and put on the new?

*Visio divina – a thoughtful and slow way of contemplating a visual prompt like a piece of art, photograph or image and inviting God to speak to you through it. First, focus on the detail that your eyes are drawn to right away – keep focus there and pay attention to what thoughts and emotions you are having. Then, look at the entire image and consider it as a whole, being aware of thoughts, questions and emotions it provokes. End in silence and prayer, considering your experience and anything you feel called to respond to.
