Reflection & Discussion Questions

Jesus is the Christ - He was always the Christ

John says - the water, the blood and the Spirit all tell us the same thing.

Read and discuss I John 5:6-10(ESV)

⁶ This is he who came by water and blood—Jesus Christ; not by the water only but by the water and the blood. And the Spirit is the one who testifies, because the Spirit is the truth. ⁷ For there are three that testify: ⁸ the Spirit and the water and the blood; and these three agree. ⁹ If we receive the testimony of men, the testimony of God is greater, for this is the testimony of God that he has borne concerning his Son. ¹⁰ Whoever believes in the Son of God has the testimony in himself. Whoever does not believe God has made him a liar, because he has not believed in the testimony that God has borne concerning his Son.

*In light of the historical context, what do these verses say about God? About people?

*How is John answering the question of who Jesus was in this passage?

Religion is a fence not a well But Jesus is a well not a fence

John is simply defending the well.

- *What does the fence and well analogy mean?
- *What is helpful about fences? How can fences be harmful?
- *What fences have you built in your life? Why did you build them?

The fence doesn't save us...Jesus does

It is simply believing and hoping in a Savior.

Read and discuss I John 5:11-13(ESV)

¹¹ And this is the testimony, that God gave us eternal life, and this life is in his Son. ¹² Whoever has the Son has life; whoever does not have the Son of God does not have life. ¹³ I write these things to you who believe in the name of the Son of God, that you may know that you have eternal life.

- *What do these verses say about God? About people?
- *What kind of eternal life is John talking about here?
- *Do you see fence and well language here?
- *What about life, church, religion makes it hard to find the well? How can we fight for the well in our lives?

Hold onto Jesus tightly and hold doctrinal issues with humility

We need to read our Bibles, and honor the authority of scripture when we take the time to understand its context.

*What does it look like to read the Bible responsibly and with humility?

*What tools do you use to help you understand the Bible and its context?

*What are some ways to continually work to keep first things first?
