Reflection & Discussion Questions

Joel writes after a horrible tragedy has happened

We are exposed to much tragedy due to the times we live in.

*What types of response to tragedy have you seen Christians/the church give? *How does that contrast with the ways we have seen the prophets speak about it?

Joel guides us in our response to disaster and tragedy

Read and discuss Joel 1:8-13(NIV) ⁸ Mourn like a virgin in sackcloth grieving for the betrothed of her youth. ⁹ Grain offerings and drink offerings are cut off from the house of the LORD. The priests are in mourning, those who minister before the LORD. ¹⁰ The fields are ruined, the ground is dried up; the grain is destroyed, the new wine is dried up, the olive oil fails.

" Despair, you farmers, wail, you vine growers; grieve for the wheat and the barley, because the harvest of the field is destroyed. ¹² The vine is dried up and the fig tree is withered; the pomegranate, the palm and the apple tree all the trees of the field—are dried up. Surely the people's joy is withered away.

¹³ Put on sackcloth, you priests, and mourn; wail, you who minister before the altar. Come, spend the night in sackcloth, you who minister before my God; for the grain offerings and drink offerings are withheld from the house of your God.

*What does Joel call for in response to the locust plague? *What is your painkiller strategy in tragedy? *How has a failure to grieve affected you? Is there a loss festering in your life that you want to share about?

In moments of great grief, people of God turn to Him with all of their hearts

Read and discuss Joel 2:12-14 (NIV) ¹² "Even now," declares the Lord, "return to me with all your heart, with fasting and weeping and mourning." ¹³ Rend your heart and not your garments.

Return to the Lord your God, for he is gracious and compassionate, slow to anger and abounding in love, and he relents from sending calamity.
¹⁴ Who knows? He may turn and relent and leave behind a blessing—
grain offerings and drink offerings for the Lord your God.

*What would 'rending your heart' look like?

*How does blame or some other painkilling strategy keep our hearts from returning to God? *How have you seen God be gracious and compassionate in tragedy or grief?
